Gassho to Both Sides

A few years ago, there was an article in the news about Korean Buddhist monks' excitement over a soccer game. Their abbot let them watch the game on TV but they were forbidden to root for either side. Maybe the abbot was giving the monks a spiritual test: all beings are equal in the Dharma. In the Dharma, there are no winners and losers. Of course, in the relative world, who won the women's world soccer championship, Japan or the USA? Did you watch it without taking sides? Or, were you like the sweet, elderly woman who was asked who she voted for in the last election? She replied, "The candidates were such fine, dedicated people I couldn't make up my mind so I just wrote on the top of the ballot, 'God bless you all."

Traditionally, monks and nuns in Buddhism never take sides; which means they are not politically active. They represent the world of enlightenment, the world of non-duality. For this reason, I believe there has been less persecution of Buddhism than


other religions. In modern times, we see many politically active monks and nuns who promote nonviolent resistance as the way of the Dharma. They do not take sides but peacefully demonstrate as a way to draw attention to a particular cause of suffering. In this way, no one is seen as an enemy. All are Dharma friends.

I certainly would not categorize myself as absolutely non-violent. However, just because we may have to engage in violent actions, it doesn't mean that our heart has to be filled with hatred or that we have to demonize the other. Living in this relative world, we are forced to make many difficult choices and Buddhism teaches personal responsibility for our actions. Even as we choose one side over the other, however, let us mentally put our hands together in gassho to acknowledge the Buddha nature of both sides – and no cheering when your side wins. That is good sportsmanship.



TEA CEREMONY (The Way of Tea) Tea ceremony in Japan is called Chanoyu, literally "hot water for tea". Sen Rikyu, who established the foundations of Chado, lived in the 16th century teaching wabi-cha, or tea of quiet taste. In Chado (the way of tea) the spiritual aspect is most important. We learn the heart of Chado through the ceremony of drinking tea. The basic principles are expressed in the words harmony, respect, purity and tranquility. Harmony can be created between persons, between objects, between a person and an object among all matters of the world. This is illustrated in the interactions between a host and a guest and the tea utensils handled. In Chado, we should respect every one and everything without distinction of status or rank. Spiritual purity is essential. We can embody tranquility only when we make harmony, respect, and purity our own. By learning Chado, we seek to obtain an ultimate peace of mind. The present Grand Tea Master teaches the thought of "peacefulness through a bowl of tea." It is very simple if we are just making tea and drinking tea. but if we trying to understand the heart of Chanoyu, we can find that it is not just making and drinking tea. Through preparing a bowl of tea we learn to look within ourselves, respect one another, make peace with others and express gratitude toward all things. - information compiled by Irene Goto

ERRATA - In the 6-12 DX notes an error occurred. According to Linda Heuman's article in the Summer edition of Tricycle (magazine) Buddhist monks in the Theravada tradition began writing texts in about the first century B.C.E. Pali writings began in about 800 C.E.

June 26 - Rev. Julie Hanada chaired the meeting. She recounted a recent comment by Mas K. who said, "Buddhism is about awareness of life, and life is about oneness of feelings". . . Rev. Julie is a hospital chaplain and has dealings with hospital personnel as well as patients. A doctor who seemed nervous, upset and sad asked her how to address a patient who was in pain and was a kind person. In his description, the patient seemed to be as nervous, upset and sad as he was. Rev. Julie saw a parallel process between the patient and the doctor. She sees her position as creating and fostering an atmosphere of compassion.

July 3 - Joe Schwab brought up one of Rev. Castro's topics in the Dharma talk of today, "What brings about happiness? Many emotions have been studied by science and gratitude is favored. What is gratitude? It is the awareness of having been given a gift. Joe indicated volunteerism makes people happy, and many people spend countless years being of help. . .Joe referred to a book, *Thanks!*, by Robert A. Emmons, Ph.D. that was discussed at the First Wednesday study group, and Shirley quoted from it. . . Irene G. reported the Kids Summer Program at the Betsuin includes about 100 exuberant kids who quiet down immediately upon hearing the first ring of the *kansho*. Recently, they studied *matsuri* (festivals.)

7-10 - Rinban Castro brought a reproduction of a Rembrandt painting, "Prodigal Son," from the gospel of Luke. A man had two sons and one of them wants his inheritance before his father dies. He left home and squandered it. The father thought of his son frequently. Finally, he came back destitute, and was welcomed by the father. A similar story from the Lotus Sutra occurred. The son returned but does not recognize the father who recognizes him. He was given menial jobs and later learned who his father was. . . The ancient Gandharan scrolls are being translated by a team at the UW headed by Richard Solomon. (See summer issue of Tricycle.). . . There are at least three Buddhist canons, and likely many more.
