## Amida Versus Shakyamuni Buddha? by Rev. Don Castro

February is the month we commemorate the death of Shakyamuni Buddha in India over 2,500 years ago. At Seattle Betsuin, we will observe Nirvana Day a few days early on Sunday, February 12<sup>th</sup> (the traditional date is the 15<sup>th</sup>). In his final instructions to his disciples in the Mahaparinirvana Sutra, the Buddha says,

"Those who, either now or after I am dead, shall be a lamp unto themselves, relying upon themselves only and not relying upon any external help, but holding fast to the Truth (Dharma) as their lamp, and seeking their salvation in the Truth alone, shall not look for assistance to any one besides themselves, it is they, Ananda, among my bhikshus (monk disciples) who shall reach the very topmost height!"

For adherents of Other Power Buddhism, there is often confusion about this passage. It seems that the Buddha is contradicting the basic teaching of Jodo Shinshu regarding the power of Amida Buddha to bring about our enlightenment. This confusion is really a semantic issue. It seems that the Buddha is telling us to rely upon ourselves alone and Shinran Shonin is telling us **not** to rely on ourselves alone but to rely on the other power of Amida Buddha. Looking more deeply, however, we need to understand that self power for the Buddha means, "seeking their salvation in the Truth (Dharma) alone" not looking to an "external power." For Shinran Shonin, other power is **not** external power. Rather, it is the power other than the deluded ego that is touched by self interest in everything it does. Other power in Jodo Shinshu means a power other than the power that keeps us running around in circles; the vicious wheel of samsara (birth-and-death).

Elsewhere in his final instructions, the Buddha told his disciples not to be attached to his physical appearance but to look to the Dharma as their guide. To see the Dharma is to see the Buddha. Amida Buddha is living dynamic Dharma, especially as experienced by those beings who are bound to the vicious circle of self power. We should note and emphasize here that one of the core teachings of Buddhism is the truth of non-self (anatman) meaning that there is no permanent, substantial core of self (soul) to cling onto. Thus, Other Power Buddhism accords completely with the fundamental teaching of the Buddha about the nature of self.

Amida Buddha is living dynamic Dharma. The light of the Dharma is the light of Amida Buddha as it is alive in all of us. Being universal, the power of Amida Buddha is non-dualistic and breaks down the delusions of internal and external, self and other. The sense of a relationship with Amida Buddha only results from our standing apart. Yet, even while standing apart, Amida Buddha is encompassing, embracing and liberating us. We only need to awaken to this Truth and "Awakened One" is what the word Buddha literally means.

Musical Notes Thank you to Kanako Kashima and Ritsuko Kawahara for braving the snow with their instruments to provide the



# **Reverend Kuwahara Conducted Chanting and Language Workshops**

On Saturday, January 14, 2012 we were treated to two seminars by Rev. Kiyonobu Kuwahara, Director of the Jodo Shinshu Correspondence Course. (Center for Buddhist Education, Buddhist Churches of America). The first seminar covered etiquette for offering incense as well as proper chanting of the Shoshinge. The second focused on Buddhism and the Japanese language.

For the first session, participants practiced offering incense, not only with the guidance of Kuwahara Sensei, but also with the help of a handout of photographs of his young son showing right and wrong ways to bow, and to open and close the incense container, and how to properly handle



the service book. We also chanted parts of the Shoshinge. We learned that, ideally, we should stay in the key that was intended for the chant, despite the challenge of doing this for those of us with higher or lower voices. Sensei also demonstrated

correct rhythm and pacing.

During the last session, Sensei shared examples of Japanese words that have a strong connection to Buddhist thought and teaching. As an example, he used arigatou, "I acknowledge the difficulty of the situation," which "expresses gratitude" as well as "describes the rareness of what we have received." He said, "The lens of Buddhist teachings bestows on us a view which shows us this world and things around us differently," and illustrates the concept of interdependence.

Everyone who attended appreciated the warmth and wisdom of Rev. Kuwahara and came away better informed about basic Jodo Shinshu rituals. Submitted by Ann Oxrieder and Fumiko Groves

All are welcome to attend this opportunity for discussion and questions typically led by Reverend Castro, Reverend Warrick, or Minister's Assistants Joe Schwab, or Irene Goto.

Jan 8, 2012 Rinban Castro posed the idea that he would like the DX kids to learn about 10 common Japanese expressions as a way to help understand Buddhism. . . Irene G remarked that we take for granted so many things in our life --accidents, death, health, waking up in the morning, trust, fear, etc. Sensei said the world of the Buddha is unconditional and boundless, and Amida is beyond measurable. We must understand our selfish "what's-in-it-for-me" attitude before we are able to comprehend beyond immeasurable.

Jan. 15, 2012 - Rinban Castro visited Japan with a group of 12 ministers in 1999 for a seminar in the Echigo prefecture. They visited many temples and probably walked on the same paths that Shinran used. He said Shinran actually brought religion to Echigo, even though he had no intention of founding a religion. Before Shinran everything was pretty much superstition. He related a story of a shaman-like person who was dispatched to kill Shinran, but became so impressed with his sincerity that he became a convert to Jodo Shinshu, or so the story goes. He wrote the first part of the Shoshingei in Chinese and the Wasan in Japanese. Buddhism spread through meetings with Shinran in homes at night. When Shinran was 60 years of age he returned to his birthplace, Kyoto as a prelude to dying. He was still very productive in his 80s and died when he was 90. His daughter put his ashes in a small pagoda, which became the foundation of the present Hongwan-ii in Kyoto. Amazingly, letters from his daughter Eshinni were found in the 1920s in the Hongwan-ji and have been preserved. Shinran had many name changes, and his last one came from using characters from two of the Seven Masters.
