Rinban Castro's Message

I was impressed by this March 2010 message from Rev. Dean Koyama on the importance of temple membership, so I sought his permission to quote, revise, adapt and shorten it to fit our temple. Members sometime ask, "What do I get by becoming a temple member?" Changing one's point of reference, the question becomes, "What have I already received from the Seattle Betsuin?"

The following story helps us think about this shift from "giving" to "receiving."

"A recently widowed mother was raising her 12-year old son. They lived in Japan in a one-room apartment. Instead of paying rent, the mother worked as the caretaker of the whole building. One day, the boy asked his mother, 'Why can't I have my own bedroom?'

"The mother responded, 'Oh, don't ask for such things. We are very lucky to have what we have.'

But the boy continued, 'My friend has his own room, his own bed and his own desk. He can do his homework or just play in his room and not bother anyone.'

"Please," the mother pleaded, "this is all that we can afford. This will have to do for now.

"Off the boy went. The young mother's heart ached for her son -- so much she wanted to provide for him. Moved by such a compassionate heart, she asked the building owner if they might be able to move into a two-bedroom apartment. She would be willing to take on more duties if this were possible.

"The owner replied that as much as he would like to help, there were no two-room apartments available. He sensed the sadness of the mother and told her, 'Just outside of your apartment, under the stairwell there is a storage room. You can clean that out and use that.'

"The mother's heart leapt. She worked hard over the following week clearing the storage room out, cleaned and even painted the walls. She found a small desk, chair and lamp. At least now he could study and play in a room of his own. After school one day, the mother surprised her son with the new room, and he was overjoyed.

"Several months passed. One day the boy asked his mother, 'I really appreciate having my own study room, but I was wondering if I can get a larger room.'

"Again, the mother pleaded, 'Please don't ask for such things. We were very fortunate to be able to even get that storage room.'

"'It gets so noisy when people go up and down the staircase above me. I can't concentrate when I do my homework,' the boy responded.

"Just try to do your best. I will see what I can do," she answered.

The boy went back to his room to study. After a while, the boy noticed that he didn't hear the noises when people went up and down the staircase. He wondered why.

When he crept to the front of the stairs, he noticed a sign in his mother's handwriting. It read, 'Please walk quietly on the stairs. Son studying underneath.' His mother was next to the sign. To every person who would walk up or down the stairs, she would bow deeply, thanking them for their cooperation.

"It was then that the boy realized the depth of his mother's love and compassion for him. He awakened a heart of gratitude and appreciation and become a dutiful son.

"The point of this story is that his mother's love was being extended whether he was in his room or not, but more importantly, whether he realized it or not."

What are some of the things that you've received from this temple, whether you realize it or not?

"If you, your parents or your children attended Dharma School, YBA, Camp Fire, Boy Scouts and felt your experiences were worthwhile you have received a benefit.

If you were married at the temple, you received a benefit of a lasting relationship with a partner and soul mate.

If you have had a loved one pass away and their funeral or memorial services were conducted under the supervision of the temple, you have received a benefit of a rite of passage during one of the most emotional periods of life.

If your child has been presented to the Sangha for Hatsumairi, you have received a benefit.

If you have developed friendships by working side by side with others during Obon, Bazaar, seminars and other programs, you have received a benefit.

"If you have learned a skill such as mochi making, rolling maki sushi, flower arranging, ukulele playing, or taiko, you have received a benefit.

"All this and more are the result of the members past and present who have said, 'Having a Buddhist Temple in this area is important.'

"This is why one should become a member. It is not about what one can receive. Rather, it is about expressing one's appreciation and gratitude for having already benefited from the temple."

President's Message

"I take refuge in the Sangha" is a phrase we recite weekly in our Threefold Refuge, but what does that mean?

What I think it means is what science has now proven -- that human beings need to feel connected in order to attain true contentment and happiness. Just reading

It was a very significant honor given to our Japanese American veterans, and a well-deserved tribute.
- Mariko Mano was also recognized earlier this year with an Award of Excellence from the Aging Services of Washington. Mariko received the award for her dedicated community service to Nikkei Concerns where she contributes a significant amount of her

time and energy, without fanfare and with no expectation of recognition.

• Sam Umeda was given the Award of Merit

Sam Umeda was given the Award of Merit by the Thunderbird District of Chief Seattle Council of the Boy Scouts of America. This is the highest award given by the District. Sam received the award in recognition of his undying dedication to making a difference in

the lives of our youth through scouting. He has been a pillar of our Troop 252, and many boys and young men have benefited from his hard work.

<u>John Yamada</u> was recognized in April by the Wisteria View Manor Board for his of dedicated service and leadership. John recently retired after 17 years of service to Wisteria View Manor. He leaves the organization on solid operating and financial footing. Wisteria View Manor provides highquality, low-cost housing to seniors.

These are but a few of the very impressive and dedicated members who make up our Sangha. They live lives committed to service and dedicated to a purpose greater than themselves. Thank you to all of you, not just for your hard work and sacrifice, but also for showing us all how one person can make a difference in improving the lives of others. SINGLE USE PLASTIC BAGS BANNED IN SEATTLE SBC Camp Fire & YBA have a Solution as their Fundraiser

Beginning July 1, 2012, Seattle retail stores are banned from providing the single use plastic bags to customers. This includes the compostable type as well.

Reusable bags are the alternative as the ban takes effect. The Seattle Buddhist Church Camp Fire and YBA organizations are selling reusable tote bags as a fundraiser and to help keep the environment green rather than having the bags thrown into landfills. Buzzle.com indicates that 100 BILLION bags are used annually in the United States alone.

These reusable tote bags are 14" X 17" and come with a plastic bottom insert. They are black with the sakufuji design in gold and "SEATTLE" in gold lettering. The bags sell 1 bag for \$3.00 or 2 bags for \$5.00. Bags can be purchased at the Temple office during regular office hours or on Sunday's after the service. They will also be sold during the Obon dance practices and the event itself in July. Howard



Good, green ideas suggested at dharma exchange

A television cook says she marinates meat in zipseal bags, washes them in the dishwasher and reuses them for the same purpose.
- •Chris resists buying those one-use pens; instead uses fountain pens, which are manually refilled.
- •Leslie said if we organized as a group, our voice would be heard in communicating with businesses which do things that harm the environment.

- Joe said that single-use products, such as razors should be overlooked in favor of old fashioned shavers which only need blade replacement.
