# "The Core of **Buddhist Service** "

My son is now taking iceskating lessons. The lessons are held at the Kraken Community Iceplex. It is such a wonderful

facility! First, he learned how to stand up and walk. Then, he gradually learned how to ice skate. Each class is only thirty-minutes long. In this short period of time the instructors have the children practice various activities, one after another. They must make lesson plans to keep the children interested while learning ice-skating skills. As I watch the lesson, I am reminded of our temple's programs and how they are planned.

Let me share my thinking about our Sunday program. I consider the time between 10:00 AM and 11:30 AM as one window. In this ninety-minute window, various programs (Dharma School, Dharma Exchange, Parent's Dharma Exchange, Japanese Service, and Temple Tour) are scheduled. The programs in the second half are planned and organized according to attendees' interests.

In the first half, all Sangha members gather in the hondo (main hall of the venerable image) to attend the Buddhist service. In the service program, there is Sutra chanting, Dharma message, Gatha, reading of a Buddhist passage, and incense offering. Sutra chanting and ritual takes approximately 15 minutes, Dharma Talk takes 15 minutes, and other segments take 15 minutes. Using this limited time, we try to provide a meaningful program.

To decide on the service program, it is important to have the core. Because it is a service program at the Buddhist temple, Buddha Dharma is the core. Because Seattle Betsuin is a Jodo Shinshu (Shin Buddhism, the True Essence of Pure Land Buddhist Teaching) temple, Amida Buddha's Guidance and Nembutsu teach-

ing is the core. As long as we keep the core, we can do a variety of programs at the temple. It is one of Jodo Shinshu temples' uniquenesses and strengths.

In our service, we chant the sutra in which Amida Buddha's wish (vow) is written. Ministers and Minister's Assistants deliver and share their appreciation of Amida Buddha's heart (wisdom and compassion). We sit facing the altar which is the embodiment of Amida Buddha's Pure Land. We offer incense with gratitude to Amida Buddha, our founder, and masters. Through these rituals and programs, we put our self (ego)centered mind aside and set Amida Buddha's view and heart in the center of ourselves. Our ego-centered mind comes back right away as we leave the hondo. So, we keep attending the Buddhist services and practicing them. The temple's hondo is the precious religious space to absorb ourselves in the Buddha Dharma. To keep the hondo as a precious religious space, Buddhist ministers clean the altar and make offerings in a proper way. Buddhist ministers wear appropriate robes to conduct services. The hondo should always be ready for Sangha to come and set the Buddha Dharma in the center of themselves.

The Standard and Tradition of Jodo Shinshu Hongwanji-ha describes the Buddhist service as follows..

"Buddhist religious services are opportunities to bow in veneration and pay respect to the Buddha and Masters, read aloud the sutras and scriptures, and praise the virtue of Amida Buddha, expressing with utmost sincerity our indebtedness and gratitude."

Master Shan-tao (613-681 CE) explained the five right practices for the followers of the Pure Land.

#### 1) chanting the Sutras

Chanting the Sutra which teaches us Amida Buddha's wish (Wisdom and Compassion)

2) meditating/contemplating on Amida Buddha

#### and his land

Sitting and facing the Altar in the hondo is one way to contemplate Amida Buddha and his land.

#### 3) worshiping Amida Buddha

In our tradition, we *Gassho* (put palms together) and *Raihai* (bow).

# 4) reciting the nembutsu (Namo Amidabutsu, I take refuge in Amida Buddha)

It is the act of true settlement which directly assures birth in the Pure Land

### 5) praising and making offerings to Amida Buddha

Offering incense, candlelight, and flowers, listening to Dharma Talks, singing Gatha, etc

Based on the definition of the Buddhist service and the five right practices, we Buddhist ministers think about the service program. Nowadays, people can take classes to study Buddhism at various colleges and universities. There are also many online Buddhist education classes. People can study Buddhism scholarly by taking these educational classes. On the other hand, people can learn and receive Buddha Dharma with their heart, mind, and all their senses through the service, ritual, and programs at the temple. Buddhist services/programs at the temple are not only for having more Buddhist knowledge but also for nurturing a Buddhist view and heart which is wide, sincere, and flexible.

Seattle Betsuin has an excellent *hondo* and wonderful Sangha members who can practice proper and meaningful "Jodo Shinshu (Shin Buddhist)" services and programs. In addition, there are many fun social activities. It is my great honor to serve the Seattle Betsuin Buddhist Temple. I look forward to organizing and participating in the Buddhist services and temple activities with you.

# April at the Betsuin

A little over three years ago, the world abruptly stopped and re-adjusted – now, we are adapting to a new post-

pandemic normal, where Covid is in the endemic stage. Some of us continue to stay home, safely distance and wear masks when out in public. Others are cautiously venturing out, and some are celebrating the end of the pandemic with open arms. Mask protocols for healthcare facilities will be lifted on April 3<sup>rd</sup>, ending the mask mandates issued by the State of Washington. However, as the safety of the Betsuin employees, volunteers, and attendees is paramount in creating a welcoming and comfortable environment for all, the Seattle Betsuin will continue to require masks in the facilities – the only exceptions will be when snacking or eating in the classrooms, gym, and dining room. When not actively eating or drinking, masks are still required in the temple areas previously highlighted. Mask requirements will be re-examined in June, at the end of the Dharma School year.

The Betsuin's annual Earth Day Service celebrates the achievements of the environmental movement and raises awareness of the need to protect Earth's natural resources for future generations.

### **Classroom Reports**

The  $1^{st}/2^{nd}/3^{rd}$  grade class observed Nirvana Day by completing a puzzle of the Buddha when he reached Nirvana at the age of 80. We celebrated Hinamatsuri (Girls Day) by learning the significance of Hinamatsuri as well as the traditions of this special day. The students then went down to the gym to see all the different Hinamatsuri doll displays. They even saw one from the Pre-War days! The students also did a Girls Day project. Thank you to the Camp Fire groups who led the Girls Day project for our students. The students celebrated Spring Ohigan by first learning about the many things that change in the Spring. They then listened to the story about Shinran Shonin going through his Tokudo ordination and his poem that he wrote. It reads "Cherry Blossoms that are felt to last till the morrow, may blow away tonight." They learned how things are impermanent and changing all the time, just like the cherry blossoms. To remember this, they made a cherry tree using pink tissue paper for the cherry blossoms. The class reviewed the meaning of the Eightfold Path and Wheel of Dharma. They made a spinner wheel to remind them of the eight practices the Buddha taught to like ourselves and to be liked by others.

The 4<sup>th</sup>/5<sup>th</sup> grade class enjoyed viewing the beautiful Hinamatsuri dolls and making the craft during BWA's Hinamatsuri. In preparation of Hanamatsuri, we are finishing the favors that we had started in March of 2020! So, these favors are 3 years in the making! We hope that everybody enjoys them when they come to Hanamatsuri on April 2<sup>nd</sup>. We are also making our own personal Hanamidos in class!

# **Unforgettable...The Lotus Skyliners Story**

For the past two years, a dedicated group of volunteers, many of whom are members of the affiliated Buddhist Churches of America, have been actively involved in compiling a book about the Lotus Skyliners. The Lotus Skyliners was a swing band that was popular in the greater Seattle area and up and down the West Coast in the 1950s and 1960s. All of the band members were in their teens when their families returned from being imprisoned in concentration camps and the group was formed.

The book will be entitled "How a Big Band Lifts Up a Small Community", and will be available for sale at book signing events and through online sellers like Amazon. The Wing Luke Museum of the Asian Pacific American Experience is the fiscal sponsor and Chin Music Press is the publisher.

The initial book signing and meet and greet event will be held at the Seattle Betsuin Buddhist Temple, located at 1427 South Main Street in Seattle, on Sunday, June 11, 2023 from 3:00 pm to 5:00 pm. Former members of the Lotus Skyliners will attend and big band music will be provided by the Rich Hirano quartet. Light refreshments will be provided at this free event. The publication of this book was made possible by a large group of Jump Start donors and generous grants from the Muckleshoot Indian Tribe and 4Culture of King County.





The 2023 Taitetsu Unno Memorial Lecture will be held in person at the Jodo Shinshu Center on Friday March 31, as well as virtually.


Dr Ruben Habito will deliver a talk entitled "Beyond Transcendence Back to Earth: A Challenge to Religions in our Time of Global Crisis."
