Jodo Shinshu Nishi Hongwanji-ha

The 850th Anniversary of Shinran Shonin's **Birth** by Rimban Katsuya Kusunoki

This year 2023 is the year of the 850th anniversary of our founder Shinran Shonin's Birth. Also, next year 2024 is the 800th anniversary of the establishment of Jodo Shinshu teaching. At our mother temple, Hongwanji in Kyoto Japan, the joint services to celebrate these two anniversaries are held from March to May this year. The Seattle Betsuin Japan Tour itinerary includes joining the celebration service.

Shinran Shonin was born in 1173 (Jo'an 3). There is no record of what his childhood name was. His childhood name is often referred to as

"Matsuwakamaru (松若丸)". 松 (matsu) is a

pine tree. 若 (waka) means young. 丸 (maru) means round and is often use for a title for boy. So, "Matsuwakamaru" means "young boy matsu". The kanji character matsu 松 consist of "木 (ki)" and "公

(ko)". "木 (ki)" means tree and could be separated

as "十, ten" and "八, eight" which implies Amida Buddha's eighteenth vow (primal vow). The kanji character "公 (ko)" means prince. Shinran Shonin revealed Amida Buddha's teaching (Primal vow) for us to be born into Amida Buddha's Pure Land and attain enlightenment. Therefore, later, someone called

him Matsuwakamaru (松若丸) as his childhood name with respect.

It is certain that he was born in 1173 but, again, there is no record of his date and place of birth. In the *Edo* era (1603-1868), Shinran Shonin's date of birth was set on April 1st on the lunar calendar which is recognized as May 21st in the western calendar. It is said that Shinran Shonin was born in Hino, Kvoto, present Fushimi-ku in Kvoto. Shinran Shonin's father's family, Hino fami-

ly, used to live there. And there is a Buddhist temple, Hokkaiji temple in Hino. The temple has an Amida hall which was built in 1051. Shinran Shonin might have sat there and paid reverence to the Amida Buddha's statue when he was a child. To recognize his birthplace, our sect, Jodo Shinshu Hongwanji-ha, built a temple right next to Hokkaiji temple in 1828. It is the current Hino Tanjo-in temple. Please visit Hokkai*ji* temple and *Hino Tanjo-in* temple when you have chance.

Gotan'e service (Service for Shinran Shonin's Birth) has been observed since 1874 at our mother temple Hongwanji. Students and young adults conducted the celebration gathering of his birth in 1887. Around that time the local temples in Japan also started conducting Gotan'e service. Currently on the morning of May 21st, students attending Jōdo Shinshū affiliated schools take part in the musical/choral chanting service.

Fifty years ago, the joint celebration of the 800th anniversary of Shinran Shonin's Birth and the 750th anniversary of the establishment of Jodo Shinshu teaching was held. At that time, a Music service, "Gohonden saho" ritual, was established. Gohonden (lit. 'Major Scripture'), refers to Shinran Shonin's main work, Kyogyoshinsho, or The True Teaching, Practice, and Realization of the Pure Land Way. The then religious leader (Shonyo Gomonshu) gathered young adults and students and conducted the music service.

In 2023, the New Gohonden Saho ritual was established in which all the verses in this new ritual were selected from Kyogyoshinsho. The melody was composed blending traditional Tendai Buddhist choral -style chanting and chanting that developed among the general public, hopefully making it approachable for everyone.

There are two variations to the new liturgy: Style I, melody blending Tendai Buddhist choral-style chanting with chanting that developed among the general public and Style II, the Junirai melody that we have been long familiar with.

I am not sure which style is going to be used for the service when Seattle Betsuin's Tour group will attend on May 10th. Whichever the style is conducted, I look forward to listening and joining the new ritual. I hope we can chant the new style of Shoshinge at the Seattle Betsuin one day.

We thoroughly enjoyed the wonderful reunion of community and celebrating Hanamatsuri together this month! So many hands went into planning this festive event and Ron and the committee prepared a delicious meal that we all enjoyed! Thank you! The following week Kodomo no Basketball restarted and will continue through May 7. Some of our temple groups will be hosting fundraising lunches during the basketball sessions, so thank you for supporting our youth groups! It was also nice to welcome back the Earth Day/Music service, with singing our sutra and enjoying live music from the Bodhi Ensemble. We received a message from Castro Sensei, who reminds us that as Buddhists, we are also ecologists, and that we all must do our part to protect our Mother Earth.

Classroom Reports

The 1st/2nd/3rd grade class learned about the six paramitas and made a collage of the six paramitas. For Hanamatsuri, the students completed 2 different puzzles – one with the baby Buddha and an elephant, and another with children pouring sweet tea over the Hanamido. They then decorated Hanamatsuri door hangers to celebrate Buddha's birthday. The next week, the class talked about each of the Three Treasures and how they are interdependent and cannot exist without each other. They also discussed what it means to take refuge in the Three Treasures, and they made a diagram to show each treasure and the interconnection among them. We also discussed Earth Day and why it's important to recycle and what we can do to save the earth. The students then made an Earth Day crown which showed a few things that they can do to save the earth.

The 4th/5th grade class hopes that the sangha enjoyed and will use the flower pens that we made as favors for Hanamatsuri! During the month of April we learned more about Hanamatsuri and the hana-mido. We made individual hanamidos using recycled materials, and talked about ways that we can help protect our environment, reusing, reducing and recycling. We also joined the middle school class one Sunday and enjoyed playing trivia with the older students.

Betsuin Tea Talk May 2023 Are You Buddhist?

March 30th, the Betsuin's seminar series featured Rev. Anne Spencer from the Idaho/Oregon Buddhist Temple, and her presentation, "Are you Buddhist? Am I a Buddhist? And Does what We Call Ourselves Matter?" The discussion evolved into questions about why some participants considered themselves Buddhists, while a few others selflabeled as somewhat Buddhist. All expressed their appreciation for the Buddha Dharma teachings, but each individual experienced different emotions when describing their affiliation with the religion. Whether you are Buddhist, almost Buddhist or just beginning your journey with the dharma teachings, each person is on a different path and in different stages of their lives. One insight that resonated with me, regarding Jodo Shinshu Buddhism, is that Buddhism does not require you to register with an organization, attend confirmation classes or declare your affiliation with the religion. There is no deity that oversees everyday life and everyone is welcome to listen, read and study Buddha's teachings.

The Lotus Skyliners Story - A Big Band Lifts Up a Small Community

Imagine this. A group of twenty-two teenage boys - all wearing identical baby blue sport jackets and many sporting black, slicked-back hair - accompanied by a female vocalist and a Caucasian band leader. Their next step would be onto the auditorium stage of the Seattle Betsuin Buddhist Temple for the first time. It was 1953 and this group was a swing band known as the **Lotus Skyliners.** Within this group were Japanese American teenagers who were among the youngest incarcerated in concentration camps during World War II. Following the War, they and their families had returned to reside in the Seattle area, many in the vicinity of the Seattle Temple.

Recognizing an urgent need within this community, leaders of the Seattle Betsuin Temple rolled up their sleeves and helped nurture this band. It quickly became a community favorite and commanded the stage at many dances, school proms, private parties, weddings, and even a bar mitzvah. Over nine years, they also toured up and down the West Coast of Washington, Oregon, and California and played at temples in Spokane, Ontario, Sacramento, Oakland, San Francisco, Berkley, San Jose, Los Angeles, San

Diego, and Portland. One of those stops was at the Civic Auditorium in San Jose, sandwiched in between the night after Ella Fitzger-



ald sang and the day before Louis Armstrong played! For those who were around during this time, you may recall former band members Akira Ichikawa, the piano player, and Shinya Ichikawa, the trombone player, who were sons of former Rinban Tatsuya Ichikawa.

Over the last three years, a volunteer committee of five former Lotus Skyliners and four volunteers diligently joined forces to document the band's story. But they weren't alone. Much initial support came from Kemi Nakabayashi and the BCA Music History Subcommittee, and Andrea Mano and Dana

Nakashima of the Seattle Betsuin's Archives Committee. Early on, Reverend Irene Goto and the Dharma Exchange hosted an announcement of the Lotus Skyliners project with book committee members Janet Baba and Shinya Ichikawa. Bishop Reverend Marvin Harada made a donation from BCA's Expansion Fund and Reverend Katsuya Kusunoki wrote an endorsement for the book. We are very grateful for their assistance.

This book was generously funded by a host of former Lotus Skyliners and their friends, and was accompanied by equally generous grants from the Muckleshoot Indian Tribe and 4Culture of King County. Wing Luke Museum of the Asian Pacific American Experience is the fiscal sponsor and Chin Music Press is the publisher.

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CLIQUES Today, the world seems made up of cliques, on a major scale. One strong faction within a given country, against a second or third faction, within other countries, playing extremely dangerous, pitiful "games", with the lives of their peoples.

Then, within a given country, one powerful group conniving against another. It continues on and on, not as well known generally, but still with its dragnets. It filters down into churches, clubs, schools or to handfuls of individuals forming cliques against various individuals. It is a cruel thing, which isolates some from friendship, help, compassion and participation as full members of a group. It often leaves permanent damage to the lives and spirits of the ones on the receiving end of this tremendously petty pastime, and discriminate.

There may not be any immediate dramatic answers available to the world . . . that it is willing or capable of following, at this stage of humanity. But there are many things that can be done on the immediate scene, with which we are most familiar . . . and this is where things start.

First, at home, where attitudes commence. Avoid petty dislikes and jealousies. Be friends not just relatives. Remember the world is forever crying for understanding and brotherhood.

If we cannot appreciate, understand or forgive our own family members, we aren't apt to do it on a larger scale. The Buddha said we are all brothers and sisters, tied together in a vast net of humanity, with responsibility towards all. The destiny of one is tied up with the destiny of all. No one fully knows what is going on in the heart of another, we don't know our own hearts. Share - take turns - talk things out quietly.

We cannot remain indifferent to the problems of others, regardless of who or what they may be. To pick and choose is very small . . . of existing. To leave one member of a group or one faction, isolated, ignored, teased or treated unkindly, is to prove that we are blind, lacking in compassion and courage. The young adults of today seem to be much more aware of the feelings of others, and are trying to gain an appreciation of the cultures and religions of their fellow men . . . this is a step forward.

The Buddhist way would be to treat all as our much loved mothers and fathers. All are on the long journey of discovering their oneness with Amida . . . lend them a courageous, compassionate and helping hand.

ABOUT THE PRESENTERS

Rev. David Quirke-Thornton is a member of the Shin Buddhist Fellowship UK Formerly a Franciscan friar, he trained as a Buddhist Chaplain at The Buddhist Society in London and has served as chaplain to the police. In 2019, he received Tokudo ordination from Jodo Shinshu Hongwanji-ha in Kyoto. Rev Quirke Thornton went through Zen and Tibetan Buddhism after leaving the Franciscan order and is now ordained as a Jodo Shinshu Priest. He is planning on receiving his Kyoshi ordination this year. He works as the strategic director for Children's and Adult Services in London.

Rev. Dr. Carmela Javellana-Hirano is the assistant minister of the Salt Lake Buddhist Temple. She was raised in the Philippines in a devout Catholic family. Her older brother was a Catholic priest and older sister a Catholic nun. After a personal spiritual crisis, she became interested in Zen Buddhism and in 1999 moved into the Salt Lake Zen Center, intending to become a Zen priest. She then met Rev. 




Musical Notes by Kemi Nakabayashi
