No Soldiers and Weapons

hyogamuyo by Rimban Katsuya Kusunoki

Here is one of my favorite passages from the larger Sutra volume 2.

"Wherever the Buddha travels, be it country, province, town, or village, there is no place which does not benefit from his virtue. Peace and reign throughout the land. The sun and moon shine brightly, the wind and rain are timely, and no disaster or disease ever occurs. The land is prosperous, and the people live in peace, so there is no need to use soldiers and weapons. People respect virtue, cultivate benevolence, and diligently observe propriety and humility."

It is called "A passage of Peace and Harmony (*wajunsho*)". Wherever the Buddha's teaching spread, people can live in Peace and harmony. There are no natural disasters and diseases. Because it is peaceful, there is no need to use soldiers and weapons. People respect and support each other. It is such a beautiful teaching, and we should always keep it in mind.

Our family grows some plants and vegetables on our porch. One day I heard a buzzing sound when I was watering the plants. When I looked up, I found a drone flying in the sky. Probably, someone from our neighborhood playing with the drone. I assumed that it is not easy to remotely control it, but the person was doing so well. It is also a popular toy for kids. At that time, the first thing came up in my mind was that the drone is now used as a weapon in the Russo-Ukraine war. If it was an armed drone, there would be no way to hide, and my life would be easily taken. A drone could be both a toy for children and a weapon to take others' lives.

Science and technology are improving rapidly. Many things can be done easily now which we could not even imagine many years ago. At the same time, new weapons using leading-edge technology are also produced one after another. Science and Technology can be used to save people's lives, but it could also be used for taking people's lives. Science and technology have improved a lot. How about our human nature? How about our heart and mind? It seems that human being's heart and mind have not grown since the far past. Human beings have kept fighting each other since a hundred and thousands of years ago. People keep pursuing how they can win a war. How do they defeat the enemy and make everything go as they want.

"No war, no fighting. No need to use weapons. We should not kill each other; instead, we should respect each other and live in peace and harmony." When people hear these words, some people may think that these words are empty theories. But we should realize that it is how people's hearts and minds are disordered. Even if science and technology are improved, war and fighting will never disappear because our heart and mind are unsettled.

We need to seriously seek how our heart and mind are matured and settled. We may only think about how we can make this outside world peaceful. We have to know that world peace comes from our inner peace. People always think that they want to have an advantage over others. They always hate that things are not going as they want. When these feelings grow in our mind, we easily lose kindness, tolerance, and flexibility. It causes conflicts and war. It causes people to start producing new weapons to defeat the enemy. It is important to always examine ourselves to determine whether we have kindness, tolerance, and flexibility in our heart. We all need to have a mirror to see ourselves. Buddha Dharma is the mirror to show us our heart and mind as they are.

At the beginning, I introduced a passage from the Larger Sutra (A passage of peace and harmony). Before this passage in the Larger Sutra, it is written that the aspect of human beings who are full of blind

passions deceive, hate, and fight each other. It prevents people from seeking the path of true happiness, (enlightenment). The Buddha saw how human beings are living in this world and showed a path to leave the cycle of sufferings and to guide them on how they can live in peace and harmony. The passage of peace and harmony is important guidance to attain perfect enlightenment. The passage is not telling us an idealistic theory. We should be always mindful of the passage as guidance to make our heart and mind peaceful.


