"First Pitch" by Rimban Katsuya Kusunoki



At 12:46PM, Sunday, August 25th, an historical ceremonial first pitch was thrown at the Seattle Mariners game at T-Mobile Park. I was the pitcher, and my son Yuiya was the catcher. It was a

pitch on the high inside corner. It should be the first time that a Buddhist minister, who wore minister's attire (*fuho* and *wagesa*), threw a first pitch from the pitching mound at a Major League Baseball game. Many people supported this first pitch. Some people even came to this game from California. Some people made donations although they could not come to the game. I would like to express my deepest appreciation to all the people who supported this event.

Let me share three good and meaningful things which I felt from this first pitch. First, it was a fundraising event to raise money for Seattle Betsuin's Arson Restoration Fund; \$5 per purchased ticket from Seattle Betsuin's website was donated to Seattle Betsuin. Second, it was a great promotion for Seattle Betsuin. Those who did not know Seattle Betsuin Buddhist Temple could recognize our existence and who we are. Last, it was a precious opportunity to reconnect people to Seattle Betsuin. After the fire, many people were disconnected from the temple. But, because of this first pitch, many people including non-members also talked about this first pitch and our temple. I would like to cherish the karmic connections between these people and the temple.

I flattered myself for my first pitch that really went well. My son also made a great catch! Some people said, "How could you throw the ball even while you wore the minister's robe?" Let me tell you the secret of how to throw a baseball to the target.

When you throw the ball, you turn your eyes, left arm (right arm if you are lefty), and left leg (right leg if you are lefty) straight into the catcher's mitt (the target). If you do it right, you can throw the ball to the target. Please try it!

It is important to turn ourself in the right direction. But this logic can apply to different situations as well. When I see a chorus group, all choir members are facing their conductor, then they can

create beautiful harmony. When my son was in preschool, his teacher told the students, "Please turn your eyes and belly button toward me." Then the teacher started talking to students. Indeed, it was as the teach-



er said. When students turned their eyes and belly button, they totally faced their teacher who was speaking. They were all ready to listen to their teacher's talk.

Nowadays, most temples have installed a TV monitor or screen in the Hondo (main hall). Sutra is also shown on the screen for sutra chanting. Many ministers prepare a slideshow and show it when they deliver their Dharma Talk. Things are all changing. Each temple and minister try to adopt the latest technology for service and propagation. But I have a question and concern whether we really turn ourselves in the right direction during the service at the temple. Are we facing Amida Buddha when we chant Sutra? Are we facing a speaker when we listen? Now, everything is shown on a monitor, so our body and mind naturally turn toward the monitor rather than facing to Amida Buddha. The distance between the pitcher's mound and home plate is about 60 feet. It is quite a distance. When a pitcher throws a ball, the ball goes somewhere else if pitcher's eye, arm and leg are even slightly off target. We may think it is just a slight angle difference between turning Ami-

da Buddha and turning the monitor. But, after 5 years, after 10 years, it may make a big difference.

In Amida Sutra, "Beyond a hundred thousand Kotis of Buddha-lands westwards from here, there is a land called 'Perfect Bliss'. In that land there is a Buddha called Amida who is expounding the Dharma at this moment." It teaches us that Amida Buddha is now preaching Buddha Dharma to us from the Pure Land. As the Jodo Shinshu followers, we turn ourselves to Amida Buddha. It is the preparation and attitude of the listener. We listen to Amida Budddha's guidance and live our life walking toward Amida Buddha's Pure Land. It is the way we walk this Nembutsu path. We call the room "hondo" (main hall) because it is the precious space where Amida Buddha's statue is enshrined. It is the place where we correct our direction and directly face Amida Buddha. The home altar is another important place to remind us of how we physically and religiously face Amida Buddha. It is important to utilize technology for propagation. But, even if we make use of abundant technology for our service, we miss the opportunity to receive the Buddha's teaching unless we turn the right direction. Please think again whether you truly turn yourself to Amida Buddha and you are ready to listen to Amida Buddha's guidance.

Happy October On September 22nd

we held two milestone events since fire struck the temple on New Years' Eve: the opening day Dharma of School and service in the temple dining hall. It was so nice to see so many Dharma friends and Dharma School families together again. Thank you to the Dharma School board and teachers for working so hard to continue holding Dharma School in these challenging times.

The 22nd was also the Autumnal equinox, known as O-Higan in Japan. In our Jodo Shinshu tradition, O-Higan is a time to reflect on the Six Paramitas (perfections) of Dāna, generosity (fuse, 布施); Śīla, virtue (jikai, 持戒); Kṣānti, patience (ninniku, 忍辱); Vīrya, energy (shōjin, 精進); Dhyāna, concentration (zenjō, 禪定); and Prajñā, insight, wisdom (hannya, 般若). Today I would like to focus on Dāna:

Twelve Seattle Betsuin Sangha volunteers helped staff at Beacon Hill International Elementary School set up classrooms and the library on August 28, 2024 just before the start of the school year.

Tina Ko, Susie Yamane, and Kathy Hasegawa had once been students at Beacon Hill, and Nina Kato taught there.

Kanako Kashima and Mae Yamasaki shared their experiences, saying that in the kindergarten area they coded art supplies, labeled workbooks, cubbies and folders, then went to the library to cover new books. Other helpers worked in the gym.

The impetus for the activity came from Reverend Irene who wanted to create a Sangha-wide volunteer project. The inspiration for this particular project was a twelve-year-old program involving many churches in Bellevue who send volunteers to elementary and middle school classrooms every year.

While this summer's program start needed a bit of smoothing out, in that teachers didn't request volunteers until the last minute, the temple turnout exceeded expectations, and the teachers and the librarian responded enthusiastically to the help they received.

Kathy Hasegawa went well beyond the call of duty. She brought carts full of office supplies donated by her office, Kubota Vision, and she plans to drop off a case of "48 kids' binoculars" at the school.

"Nina," wrote one recipient of help, "The temple volunteers were SO AMAZING. Thank you so much for thinking of us." Another said, "I was in awe of what they were able to do."

Given this positive beginning, we hope in 2025 the school's leaders will join with us to set a date in the spring and recruit more interested teachers, which will allow more Sangha members to participate in a project that this year's volunteer crew enjoyed.
